The Inspiration of Scripture 2 Timothy 3:16-17 (KJV)

16 All Scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness:

17 That the man of God may be perfect, thoroughly furnished unto all good works."

"All Scripture..."

- The word translated "Scripture" comes from the Greek word "graphe" which simply means "writing."
- Paul is definitely referring to the complete Old Testament, but also to those portions of the New Testament that were then in existence.
- Does this mean we can't trust the other books in the New Testament that were written after this? No.

2 Peter 3:15-16

- Peter speaks of Paul's Epistles as "scriptures."
 - Peter looked at Paul's writings as being on the same level as the Old Testament.
 - When we speak of "scripture" today, we mean the writings of both the Old Testament and the New Testament.
 - So every verse of the Bible, both Old and New Testament, has been written by the inspiration and guidance of God.

"...Inspiration of God..."

- Inspiration of God is the English translation of the Greek word "Theopneustos" which literally means "breathed out by God," or simply, "God-breathed" or "proceeding from God."
 - Men were the channel, but God was the source.
 - The Bible is the product of the creative breath of God.
 - It originated with Him.
 - Therefore, it is authoritative and without error in all it teaches.
 - As a result, it should be the standard for our beliefs and our values.
- Your attitude toward God's Word is your attitude toward God Himself.
 - You do not love God more than you love His Word.
 - You do not have more room in your heart and life for God than you have for His Word.

What is meant by Biblical Inspiration?

- According to the Moody Handbook of Theology, Inspiration my be defined as "the Holy Spirit's superintending over the writers so that while writing according to their own styles and personalities, the result was God's Word written-authoritative, trustworthy, and free from error in the original autographs."
- It is the supernatural influence of the Holy Spirit on the Bible's writers, which guaranteed that what they wrote was accurate and trustworthy. They wrote what God directed them to write.
 - What they wrote was the very Word of God, inspired and infallible.

2 Peter 1:20,21

- The writers of the Bible did not give their own private interpretation of things, but wrote the message which was given to them by God.
 - Some 3,800 times, the Bible declares, "God said," or "Thus saith the Lord."
 - Ex.14:1; 20:1
 - Lev. 4:1
 - Num. 4:1
 - Dt. 4:2; 32:48
 - Isa. 1:10,24
 - Jer. 1:11
 - Ezek. 1:3
 - Paul also recognized that the things he was writing were the Lord's commandments
 - 1 Cor. 14:37
 - · And they were acknowledged as such by the believers
 - 1 Thess. 2:13
 - John recognized that his teaching was from God; to reject his teaching was to reject God (1 Jn. 4:6).
- The Bible is the product of the creative breath of God.
 - It originated with Him.
 - Therefore, it cannot be anything else but absolutely true and trustworthy at all points.
- Whatever the Bible says about itself, man, God, life, death, history, science, and every other subject is true.
 - This does not mean that every statement in the Bible is true, because the Bible records the lies of men and of Satan.
 - But the record of it is true.
- As a result of the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, the Bible is just as accurate and true in its factual statements as if God Himself had taken a pen and written the words.

The Verbal, Plenary Inspiration View

- "Verbal"--signifies "words."
- "Plenary" means "full" or "complete," as opposed to partial.
 - So, this view holds that the words themselves, and all of them, are inspired.
 - · God gave full expression to His thoughts in the words of the Bible.
 - He guided the very choice of the words used within the personality of the writers.
 - The inspired writers used "words" which the Holy Spirit taught.
- 2 Pet. 1:19-21; Heb. 1:1-2
 - The truth insisted on in the Scriptures is that the very words originally given by God to men were God-breathed.
 - God gave more than just the "thoughts," He gave the very "words" to the writers.
- · Matthew 4:4
- Exodus 24:3-4
- Deuteronomy 27:1-8
- Jeremiah 1:9
- I Corinthians 2:13
- Revelation 21:5
- Galatians 3:16
 - Paul's entire argument rested on the distinction between the singular and plural of one word!
- Although some parts of the Bible were given by dictation (Ex. 20:1..."Then God spake all these words."), the books of the Bible reveal a distinct contrast in style and vocabulary, suggesting the authors were not mere robots.
 - If the dictation theory were true, the style of the books of the Bible should be uniform.

Matthew 22:43-45; John 10:34-35

Jesus' arguments rest on the accuracy of a single word of the Bible.

Matthew 5:18

- "Jot"--The smallest Greek vowel and is generally taken to represent the smallest Hebrew letter "yodh," which looks like an apostrophe (')
- "Tittle"--Refers to the minute distinction between two Hebrew letters.
 - An equivalent would be the distinction between an "O" and a "Q"

- So Jesus was saying that is was easier for Heaven and Earth to pass away than for the smallest detail of the Law to be set aside.
 - So the Bible is God's Word even to the smallest detail.
- This makes the Bible God's book, and differentiates it from all other writings in the world.
- It is God's message to man--His only true revelation of Himself to mankind in written form.
- It is totally trustworthy and is the only safe and reliable guide for time and eternity.
